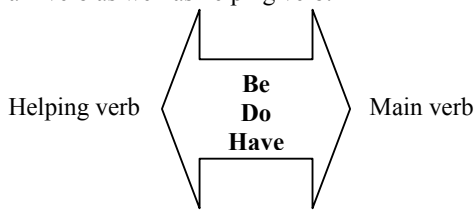


PRIMARY AUXILIARY VERBS - BE, DO, HAVE

Primary auxiliary verbs are used as main verb as well as helping verb.



BE

Be forms	Present am, is, are	Present Participle being	Past was, were	Past Participle been
-----------------	-------------------------------	------------------------------------	--------------------------	--------------------------------

BE as main verb

In some sentences, "BE" is used as main verb. In this manner it is called as 'linking verb'.

E.g.:- *The water **is** very cool.*
*I **am** very hungry.*
*It **was** magnificent.*

In these all sentences, the verb "BE" is used as main verb.

BE as helping verb

In some sentences, the verb "Be" is used to help another verb to form one of its tenses, moods, or voices.

E.g.:- *I **am** watching my favourite programme.*
*Navaz **is** going with his mother.*

DO

Do forms	Present do, does	Present Participle doing	Past did	Past Participle done
-----------------	----------------------------	------------------------------------	--------------------	--------------------------------

Do as main verb

In some instances the verb "DO" uses as main verb.

E.g.:- *I **do** the work.*
*He **does** the work.*
*They **did** their work.*

DO as helping verb

In some instances the verb "DO" uses as helping verb.

E.g.:- ***Do** you go to the exhibition?*
***Does** he know about public library?*
 [In this two sentences, the verb Do is used to form question.]
*I **do not** do the work.*

HAVE

Have forms	Present have, has	Present Participle having	Past had	Past Participle had
-------------------	-----------------------------	-------------------------------------	--------------------	-------------------------------

Have as main verb

In some sentences the verb "HAVE" is used as main verb.

E.g.:- *I **had** a cycle.*
*Fruits **have** vitamin C.*
*She **has** a car.*

Have as helping verb

In some sentences the verb "have" is used as helping verb.

E.g.:- *We **have** met him.*
*He **has** gone home.*
*She **has** had her dinner.*
